MINOR:

Furthermore, insisting her to feature in an interview further confirms our suspicions.

On the other hand, her boyfriend Kelley's action of fetishizing black women shows white indifference.

SYMBOLS USED:

Hands play a significant role in the plot. Emira's family members are adept craftsmen who are successfully enjoying the fruits of their labour. Yet, Emira still needs to wait for the time when her hands find themselves. Unlike them, she is unenthusiastic about crafts.

LITERARY DEVICES USED:

1) Irony:
