Women in Kerala, collectively have made a lot of efforts to gain the rights that were denied to them in house and society. They have mobilised and won rights which is denied to them at house, in society and at workplace. The history of women's mobilization for rights in Kerala spans various movements and milestones.

Review of literature

- Muyarath (2016), "Kerala's first women trade union" explains that although trade union activities have a long history in Kerala, this is the first time the state has officially recognised a women's trade union. One of the key causes of the union's founding is the problems that women workers in the unorganised sector continue to confront from the mainstream, male-dominated trade unions. Penkkoottu is made up of women who work as sweepers, tailors, and salespeople in various businesses on Kozhikode's Sweet Meat Street, sometimes referred to as SM Street. Under the direction of P Viji, an SM Street tailor, they banded together to demand their rights in 2009. The "right to pee" campaign was the movement's initial attempt to address the dearth of restrooms available to female employees in businesses and organisations.
- Velayudhan (2020), "The Labour Side of the Story: Informalisation and New Forms of Mobilisation of Kerala's Women Workers" explains that the Women's Workers Union, established in Kozhikode in 2005, was one of the earliest organisations for women employed in the unorganised sector. Under Penkkoottu, AMTU was established in 2010 with the goal of ensuring worker registration and addressing further political concerns that affect women. Though the effort to install proper restrooms on SM Street and other sections of the city was not entirely successful, AMTU played a significant role in the campaign. Later, 'Right to Sit' was a state-wide campaign spearheaded by women employed in textile shops. Kerala shops and commercial establishment legislation was modified by the Kerala government as a result of this effort.

Penkkoottu

Penkkoottu, a women worker's collective, was one of the first organisations founded by women employed in the informal sector. It was established in Kozhikode as early as 2005 when women workers and salespeople from small businesses in Mittayitheruvu (Kozhikode) started to replace men employed in retail complexes. These women got together to talk about their common issues. (Velayudhan,2020). It represents a novel form of mobilization, one that goes beyond conventional unions and associations. Women workers shared experiences of unequal pay, lack of representation in decision-making, and systemic biases fuelled their collective desire for change.

What sets Penkkoottu apart is its innovative approach to mobilizing women workers. Rather than following the traditional union model, Penkkoottu operates as a network of support, empowerment, and skill-sharing among its members. It functions as a platform where women from diverse backgrounds and industries come together to exchange knowledge, offer mentorship, and advocate for their rights.
