Cora face the physical demands of the journey including long distances travel on foot and exposure to harsh weather conditions, posed important health risks to woman and heighten surveillance and suspicion for Cora by slave catchers and authorities, making it even more difficult for them to evade capture and reach freedom. Cora faced many fear at the constant threat of violence and recapture leaves for her traumatizes and fearful. Cora experiences severe psychological damage as a result of her experience escaping slavery. She struggles with emotional wounds from her mother's abandonment as well as trauma from her previous experiences as a slave, including abuse and violence. Her psychological burden is increased by her ongoing fear and uncertainty about her circumstances.

In North Carolina who helped her they hanged on the tree and slave catcher fire on the human, Cora afraid in that situation. She escaped from the place to Tennessee. Slave catcher searches her to capture in the place but Cora live as free and freedom in the Tennessee, the humans were keep her safe and secure but she caught from the slave catcher Ridgeway. Later she come out to Indiana, she works and some people of Indiana secure her but the American slave catcher destroy the place and Indiana people died and Cora escapes from all the places, seeking her freedom with underground railroad to away from the United States.

For freedom she runs to forests. "I was in Georgia. I can away" (Cora 366). she accompanied with unknown person to travel to Ollie. She get her freedom but her travelling for freedom processed during 19th century.
