

# Assam Rape Cases: Legal Framework, IPC Provisions, and Women's Protection in India

This paper focuses on analyzing the legal provisions under the IPC that deal with such crimes and the practical implementation of these laws.

## 2. Rape Situation in Assam: An Overview

According to the National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB), Assam has consistently reported one of the highest crime rates against women per capita. The NCRB's 2022 report states:

- Total rape cases in Assam (2022): Over 1,500 reported cases.- Major districts: Kamrup (Metro), Cachar, Dibrugarh, and Barpeta rank highest.- Many cases go unreported due to fear, social stigma, or lack of awareness.

Challenges Faced:- Delayed FIR lodging- Victim shaming and social stigma- Slow investigation and judicial delays- Lack of legal awareness among women

## 3. Definition of Rape under IPC

Section 375 IPC – Definition of Rape: Rape is defined as a man having sexual intercourse with a woman against her will or without her consent, including under coercion, deception, or when the woman is under 18 years of age. Consent must be free, informed, and uncoerced.

#### 4. Key IPC Sections for Protection of Women

Indian Penal Code Sections Related to Rape and Sexual Offences: Section 375 – Defines rape

Section 376 – Punishment for rape: Minimum 10 years to life imprisonment

Section 376(2) – Aggravated rape (by police, public servant, etc.): Life imprisonment Section 376D – Gang rape: Life imprisonment

Section 354 – Assault or criminal force on a woman with intent to outrage her modesty: 1-5 years + fine

Section 354A – Sexual harassment: Up to 3 years or fine

Section 354B – Assault with intent to disrobe: 3-7 years imprisonment Section 354C – Voyeurism: 1-7 years imprisonment

Section 354D – Stalking: 3 years on first conviction, 5 years on second

Section 509 – Insulting the modesty of a woman via words or gestures: 1 year + fine

#### 5. Additional Legal Protections

POCSO Act, 2012 – Applied in cases involving victims under 18 years of age. Criminal Law (Amendment) Act, 2013 – Enhanced punishment for sexual violence. Domestic Violence Act, 2005 – Covers sexual abuse within households. Information Technology Act, 2000 – Penalizes online abuse and cyberstalking.



#### 6. Process After a Rape is Reported

1. Filing FIR – Police must register an FIR under Section 154 CrPC.
2. Medical Examination – To collect evidence.
3. Statement under Section 164 CrPC – Victim's statement before magistrate.
4. Investigation – Police collect evidence, arrest accused.
5. Trial in Court – Prosecution presents evidence.
6. Verdict and Sentencing – As per IPC sections.

#### 7. Support Mechanisms for Victims

- One-Stop Centres (OSC)- National Commission for Women (NCW)- State Legal Services Authority- Assam Victim Compensation Scheme

## 8. Case Study: Example from Assam

Dibrugarh Rape Case (2021): A 16-year-old girl was raped by a school teacher. The accused was booked under IPC Section 376 and POCSO Act. He was convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment. This case highlighted the issue of school safety in rural Assam.
