
By integrating these activities into the education system, students can develop a strong moral foundation, essential for becoming responsible and ethical individuals in society.








Figure-4 reveals that 100% of the respondents from different designations have a opinion that there is a need for the students to know about ethics and values and that it has a role to play in everyone's life.






